## Key California Manufacturing Bills

### AB 57 (Quirk) Wireless Telecommunication Facilities – SUPPORT

Provides that a collocation or siting application for a wireless telecommunications facility is deemed approved if the city or county fails to approve or disapprove the application within the time periods established by the Federal Communications Commission and has been notified by the applicant that the reasonable time period has lapsed.

### AB 219 (Daly) Public Works Concrete Delivery – OPPOSE

Imposes a new regulatory burden and significant cost on infrastructure projects by expanding prevailing wage requirements to the delivery of ready mixed concrete.

Asm 51-27-2      Sen 24-13-3      Signed

### AB 305 (Gonzalez) Workers' Compensation – Permanent Disability Apportionment – OPPOSE

Undermines the principle of apportionment in the workers' compensation system and drives up permanent disability awards by prohibiting apportionment in cases of physical or psychiatric injuries filed on or after January 1, 2016 when gender-related characteristics are involved.

### AB 464 (Mullin) Transactions & Use Taxes – Maximum Combined Rate – OPPOSE

Increases the maximum combined rate for locally imposed sales taxes from two percent to three percent.

### AB 465 (R. Hernandez) Employment Arbitration Agreements – OPPOSE

Increases opportunity for class-action lawsuits and ignores well-established state and federal judicial precedent to preclude pre-dispute employment arbitration agreements.

Asm 46-31-3      Sen 22-15-3      Vetoed

### AB 645 (Williams) 50% Renewable Portfolio Standard – OPPOSE

Drives up energy prices by directing the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) to increase the renewable portfolio standard (RPS) to achieve 50 percent of electricity from eligible resources by 2030 for both investor-owned and publicly-owned utilities without regard to cost or grid reliability.

### AB 888 (Bloom) Plastic Microbeads – OPPOSE

Stifles innovation by banning substitutes which are safe and may even biodegrade faster than natural materials used as exfoliants.

### AB 1017 (Campos) State Contractors – Income Equality Program – OPPOSE

Limits an employer's inquiry into relevant information during the hiring process by precluding them from asking an applicant to disclose his or her salary history.

Asm 42-33-5      Sen 23-14-3      Signed

### SB 3 (Leno) Minimum Wage Increase – OPPOSE

Imposes 63 percent increase in the state minimum wage over the next three years by raising the wage for all industries to \$11/hr in 2016 and \$13/hr in 2017. Mandates future annual increases tied to inflation and allows local jurisdictions to adopt higher minimum wage rates.

### SB 32 (Pavley) Post-2020 Climate Change – OPPOSE

Requires ARB to establish a GHG emission limit of 40 percent below 1990 levels by 2030. Specifically directs ARB to set emissions targets for short-lived climate pollutants.

### SB 248 (Pavley) Oil and Gas – OPPOSE

Requires the submission a significant amount of additional information to the Department of Oil and Gas when they have already admitted that they are unable to effectively handle at the current time what they are already getting and before they have submitted their plan to USEPA detailing how they intend to deal which the situation.

Sen 22-18-0      2-year / Assembly

### SB 406 (Jackson) Paid Family Leave Expansion – OPPOSE

Creates the opportunity for employees to take up to 24 weeks of protected leave by expanding the persons for whom you can take leave to include grandparents, grandchildren, siblings and parent-in-laws, which are not family categories covered under the Family and Medical Leave Act.

### SB 654 (De León) Hazardous Waste Facility Permitting – OPPOSE

Required DTSC to take action on a permit application within a 3-year timeframe, but, if it did not, the permit would no longer be considered valid. As amended, the 3-year timeframe begins two years prior to expiration of the permit when the agency must deem the permit application complete. The bill passed the Senate Floor in this format. It was subsequently amended significantly with the administration's direction in the Assembly adding 24 pages of inadequately specified requirements and moved to Inactive shortly thereafter.

Sen 21-16-3      2-year / In Floor Process

### SB 763 (Leno) Flame Retardants – OPPOSE

Requires the manufacturer of juvenile products to indicate whether or not the product contains added flame retardant chemicals and the retailer to display a point of sale sign. It was voted on in this form on the Senate Floor.
