

MAKING CALIFORNIA 2019 END OF SESSION BILL LIST

California's 30,000 manufacturers employ more than 1.3 million people and make over 86% of our state's exports. Manufacturers build strong communities, train a skilled workforce, and create and support jobs in every other sector. **Help us keep this pillar of the California economy strong by supporting manufacturers' end-of-session legislative maker/breaker priority bills:**

SENATE



AB 23 (Burke) – Creating a Deputy of Business and Workforce Coordination with GO-Biz. Creates a dedicated position within the Office of the Small Business Advocate to coordinate workforce development efforts that are crucial to California's manufacturing industry. **CMTA-Sponsored Bill**



AB 48 (O' Donnell) – Bond to fund CTE education. Provides necessary funding to build California's pipeline of skilled workers.



AB 1248 (E. Garcia) – Incentive program for manufacturers revitalizing communities. Establishes a program that allows local governments to enter into partnerships with small and mid-size manufacturers as part of their plans to revitalize and develop their communities. **CMTA-Sponsored Bill**



AB 1583 (Eggman) – Enacts the California Recycling Market Development Act. Extends both the Treasurer's California Alternative Energy and Advanced Transportation Financing Authority's sales tax exclusion program, and CalRecycle's Recycling Market Development Zone loan program to January 1, 2031.



AB 51 (Gonzalez) – Bans arbitration agreements as a condition of employment. Prohibits and criminalizes the use of arbitration agreements. Such limitation is likely preempted under federal law.



AB 170 (Gonzalez) – Creates liability for actions outside of manufacturers' control. Exposes manufacturers to misplaced liability by making them responsible for harassment occurring between the employees of another company.



AB 824 (Wood) – Effective ban on pharmaceutical patent settlements. Weakens California patentholder's ability to protect their intellectual property rights from infringement, driving up the cost of medicine and delaying entries of both branded and generic drugs into the market, hurting consumers.



AB 1066 (Gonzalez) – Using unemployment insurance to fund strikes. Overreaches beyond the intended purpose of unemployment insurance by substantially extending benefits to workers on strike, depleting the funds available for workers facing an unexpected and involuntary job loss.



AB 1080 (Gonzalez) – Companion bill grant unfettered authority to regulating agency without clear legislative direction. Delegates broad authority to Cal Recycle to impose new mandates on hundreds of thousands of consumer products and packaging at their discretion and absent clear direction from, or subsequent review by, the Legislature.

ASSEMBLY



SB 54 (Allen) – Companion bill grant unfettered authority to regulating agency without clear legislative direction. Delegates broad authority to Cal Recycle to impose new mandates on hundreds of thousands of consumer products and packaging at their discretion and absent clear direction from, or subsequent review by, the Legislature.



SB 749 (Durazo) – Removes existing protections for manufacturers' trade secrets. Would transform private employers' proprietary information into a public record whenever they enter into an agreement with a state or local agency, disrupting a wide range of incentive programs and local development agreements.
